Funeral Preparation

<u>Scheduling</u>

Funeral masses are celebrated on weekdays, at a time when most people can attend, and held in the Parish where the community celebrates Sunday Eucharist. They may be celebrated on any day **except:** Sundays, Holy Days, and the Easter Triduum.

In lieu of a Funeral Liturgy (a Mass), a Funeral Liturgy of the Word may also be celebrated as well as a Memorial Mass at a later date. Please contact the Parish secretary for more details and to schedule the funeral.

Columbarium Questions and Answers

What is a columbarium?

A columbarium is a structure comprised of a series of niches (vaults) that accompany urns containing the cremated remains (also known as the cremains) of the deceased.

cremation was once prohibited by the current regulations provide for it as an alternative to traditional earth or crypt internment. Ashes must be treated with reverence due to a body, and the continues to discourage the scattering,

or division of the ashes, or private storage, but rather interring them on consecrated ground. Cremation is in harmony with the Church's oft-repeated reminder that, "*dust thou art, and unto dust thou shall return.*"

What is the cost of a niche?

The price for one niche (which can hold up to two urns) is \$3,500. This cost includes the openings/closings as well as the engravings of the granite faceplate with up to two names. This one-time purchase also includes: the license, a certificate indication the location of the niche(s), perpetual care, plus policy and operating rules.

How are ashes secured in the niche?

Ashes are secured in an urn supplied by the parishioner. Each niche is designed to accommodate up to two urns. The urn is placed in the niche of your selection after the funeral rites.

Are there regulations about who may be interred in the Corpus Christi Columbarium?

Present and former registered members of any Catholic Church of the Diocese of Charleston, together with their immediate families (including spouses, Catholic or non-Catholic, siblings, parents, and the natural adopted, step or foster children of members of the Diocese) are eligible persons for the privilege of licensing niches. The Columbarium is intended for the internment of the (non-comingled) cremated remains of Catholics who are entitled to Christian burial according to the rules and disciplines of the Roman Catholic Church and the regulations of the Bishop, and non-Catholic spouses of such Catholics.

How can a niche be selected?

A niche locator map and detailed rules and regulations are available through the Columbarium Coordinator.
